2. Other Highly Significant Names, Titles, Epithets, & Words

Rules of ancient Hebrew are followed to determine the original ancient Hebrew pronunciations and renderings of highly significant names/titles/epithets. The two most significant rules of ancient Hebrew phonetics are: 1) That the name of a letter is identical to the pronunciation/sound that same letter creates when spoken; and 2) That to spell out a name or word is the same as actually pronouncing it.

a. The Divine Tetragrammaton AYASHAYA

[Hosea 2:16... Strong's Hebrew #376....like AHYH, has The Divine First Initial "A"] (aka "Ishi" or "Husband" or "My Husband") based on **AYSY** from **Hosea 2:16**, and from which we get:

- --YASHAYA
- i. --YA-(H)----

...as in "HalleluYAH" meaning "Praise YA[H]" - a shortened form of "YAD" (meaning "hand" in Hebrew), YASHA (meaning "Saviour" in Hebrew), YASHAYA (meaning "My Saviour" in Hebrew), AYASHAYA (The Hosea 2:16 Tetragrammaton meaning "My Husband" in Hebrew), and AHAYAHA (The Exodus 3:14 Tetragrammaton meaning "I AM" in Hebrew); as well as the common denominator in The Seven Major Tetragrammatons (see Section 1D "The Divine Tetragrammaton AHYH... 'AHAYAHA'"); the letter "YA" (now known as "Yod" or "Yud") was originally depicted as a hand (with outstretched arm), thus pointing to "The Hand" of creation, "The Hand" that was pierced for our transgressions, "The Hand" that blesses us, "The Hand" that disciplines and punishes us should we defy Him, "The Hand" that leads us, "The Hand" that opens the door that we may enter, "The Hand" that upholds us, & so forth...

To say that "YA(H)" has pagan origins in that it was the name of an ancient Egyptian moon deity is to do three (3) things:

...1) Overlook the fact that there are significantly MORE pagan connections with the following: "GOD" (see Section 1a "'God' does NOT originally refer to The Almighty Creator Anointed Saviour"), "Lord" (English equivalent to ancient pagan idols "Baal" & "Adon" - the names "Baal" & "Adon" translate to "Lord"), "King" (the pagan idol "Moloch/Molek/Molech/etc." means "king"),

"church" (see https://www.beinaberean.org/writings/church.html), "Jesus" (derived from Greek "lesous" which is a composite name paying tribute to the Greek pagan deity of healing whose name was "laso" or more accurately "leso" in the Ionic dialect of the ancient Greeks, as well as the Greek chief pagan deity "Zeus" due to the "us" at the end of the name which is very common in Greek names such as "DionysUS" or "TarsUS" or "DemetriUS" etc. as it has always been a trend in ancient languages and names to pay homage to a people's chief deity (using words & names that are THEOPHORIC), much like how many Hebrew-based names pay tribute to "Ya[h]" &/or "El" in the spelling of their names, such as "JeremIAH" or "IsaIAH" or "ELiJAH" or "DaniEL" or "EzekiEL" or "MichaEL" or "IsraEL" - at the very least, "Jesus" is clearly based on the ancient Greek male form of their ancient Greek pagan deity of healing, "laso" ("leso"), as the "us" also would be a way to make the name masculine as opposed to feminine within the Greek language), "Christ" (the same pagan title given to Egyptian pagan deity Horus, as well as Egyptian & Hellenistic pagan deity Serapis, Roman Mithras & Christos Helios, and so forth; note that followers of the pagan deity Serapis were also called "Christians" and that "Christos" - from which we get the term "Christ" - is moreover a Greek form of "Krishna" which is a Hindu pagan idol), "Yahweh" (in the Canaanite pantheon of worshipped pagan idols, this was one of the 70 sons of "EI" - the chief Canaanite pagan idol over all other idols worshipped), "EI" (the two-letter "Aleph-Lamed" as opposed to "El" as a designation for The First Letter of the ancient Hebrew alphabet now known as "Aleph" - this two-letter "El" is the chief Canaanite pagan idol worshipped in their pantheon of ancient Canaanite pagan idols), "Adoni/Adonai" ("Adonis" is an ancient Greek pagan idol, and "Adonai" is a Hebrew plural form meaning "My Lords" whereas "Adoni" is a Hebrew singular form meaning "My Lord" which in essence equates with the pagan idol "Baal" which means "Lord"/"Master"), "Alahaya" (The Exodus 3:15 Tetragrammaton repeated 3 times within the same verse, which is connected to "Alah" aka "Allah" of the Muslim faith/religion... this largely explains why many Muslims believe Christians unknowingly worship "Allah" since that designation is actually found in the ancient Hebrew rendering of Exodus 3:15 multiple times - among other passages - and also with "Elohim" and the two-letter "El" whose letters, rather than "Ayin" & "Lamed," in ancient Hebrew are "Ah" and "La" - hence, "Ah-La" or "Alla[h]"), etc.;
